
## Treasurer's Report


### SHIP saw another year of operating and capital growth in 2021-2022.





## COVID-19 Response



**COVID-19** has now moved from a crisis phase into something requiring long-term management. However, during the past year, it remained an active threat that continued to impact our clients, families, staff, and communities. In response, we implemented a number of policies and practices to position SHIP for a strong recovery.

The end of 2021 and the beginning of 2022 saw a resurgence of COVID cases across Canada due to the Omicron variant strain (BA.5). In response, SHIP launched our Omicron Response Plan to tackle this challenge. The plan offered a measured approach to ramp up in-person engagements. We held a number of GO VAXX mobile vaccination clinics, encouraging staff, clients, and the community to receive their vaccination doses. We also launched our Keep Your Guard Up campaign, encouraging staff to continue to be diligent and keep up their efforts against COVID.

In the spring of 2022, we shifted towards our Restore, Recover, and Renew Plan (RRR), a framework to drive the recovery of SHIP, not just to its pre-Pandemic level, but beyond. RRR's goal is to restore services as quickly as possible and to do this safely and effectively with three areas of focus:

Safety, Wellness and Engagement, and the Future.

An anonymous staff poll in May had over 90% of respondents say they felt their health and safety was being prioritized at SHIP. Our staff have been extraordinary in their response to unprecedented demands and have delivered services in new and innovative ways. Our Restore, Recover and Renew Plan will see us through to the end of 2022, and we will continue to maintain our vigilance in protecting the health of our staff, our clients, their families, and our communities.

## SHIP's 30th Anniversary



SHIP is turning 30! Over the next year, as we embark on three decades of providing housing and supports in the community, we will be recognizing the achievements and challenges of the past 30 years and reflecting on the lives that we have touched through our talented staff, valued clients, their families, funders, volunteers, and our partners in the community.

SHIP started with Parsons Place in Brampton, a recovery residence for 8 individuals and 4 years later, we opened a second residence, Hammond House, in Mississauga. This was our beginning. Fast forward to today, we have grown to provide support to over 5000 individuals across our communities.

Now and looking ahead, we remain a person-centered, person-focused community organization. We actively continue to expand our capacity to provide health services and housing support to the communities we serve creating new opportunities for services through innovative partnerships with stakeholders.

In 1992, we began as an organization dedicated to providing housing and hope with the fundamental belief that housing is a human right and with appropriate supports people can thrive in their community. In 2022, this continues to be our internal compass.

## Equity, Diversity & Inclusion

SHIP continues to do the work of building bridges while breaking down barriers within our systems, community, and organization. Our work together continues and is embedded with our strategic plan EDI work is challenging, but together as a SHIP community, we will journey forward with EDI as a priority through our actions.



## Spotlight: Peel Family Shelter

### July 2021, SHIP was awarded the Regional contract to provide homelessness services at Peel Family Shelter (PFS).

PFS is a low-barrier, easy-access living environment for families in need of shelter for short periods of time. The main focus is providing housing stability and case management supports.

This program is an important pillar for housing stability in our community. In August 2021, dozens of families were displaced from their homes after a severe thunderstorm flooded a Regional building. PFS was able to provide immediate emergency housing support to over 40 individuals (10 families) who were the victims of this flood.

### From July 2021 to the present, we have:

- Successfully diverted 152 families away from the emergency shelter system
- Discharged **71%** of our clients to permanent housing solutions
- Ensured that 90% of all families have a housing plan developed and engaged with SHIP staff within 15 days of arrival at PFS
- Connected and provided wellness and food security services to 100% of all clients

## Spotlight: Back to Home

SHIP was successful in securing funding through Ontario's Back To Home strategy. Through this funding, SHIP will provide supportive housing and community mental health supports for individuals identified as Alternative Level of Care (ALC), who no longer require hospital-level acute care. SHIP's model of care is aligned with the province's priority to alleviate existing ALC pressures in hospitals, and reduce the rate of hospitalizations and emergency room presentations over time by improving health and social outcomes and helping individuals remain stability housed.



## Spotlight: Capital Properties

### First Street, Orangeville

SHIP purchased 236 First Street in Orangeville in 2021 with the goal of converting it into affordable and supportive housing. The renovated property will provide individuals residing in Dufferin who are experiencing housing challenges with the opportunity for quality permanent housing that is affordable, safe, and sustainable. The property's 25 single units and 2 two-bedroom units will feature energy efficiency enhancements to improve our environmental impact, and we will be expanding to meet the needs for accessibility for individuals with mobility or sensory impairments. SHIP is proud to be developing new, affordable housing opportunities within Dufferin County, helping to alleviate the systemic housing and homelessness issues that this community currently experiences. We look forward to the completion of the building renovations, with a projected date of early summer 2023.



### **Shaw Drive, Mississauga**

Through a partnership with the Region of Peel and the Reaching Home Fund, SHIP was able to purchase and renovate an existing building in south Mississauga. The building, located on Shaw Drive, was renovated extensively, implementing many property enhancements and creating a positive impact in the neighbourhood. The building has four units that will house families who are currently experiencing homelessness within the Region of Peel. SHIP is excited to have had this opportunity, and we eagerly anticipate our new tenants as we look forward to the future.



## Community Engagement

SHIP is fortunate to partner with many organizations. We share our gratitude to our wonderful donors who have supported SHIP clients throughout the past year across Peel, Dufferin, Etobicoke, and York. We are especially grateful to our regular donors: Hello Fresh and The Mississauga Food Bank. They've worked collaboratively with us over the past year, ensuring clients receive food security that is healthy, nutritious, and culturally appropriate.





### Volunteers

Volunteers are an important part of SHIP, strengthening our ability to provide the best service and support to our communities. During the Pandemic, we've been working closely with our community volunteers, both individuals and groups, to ensure a safe experience while maintaining those connections.

### **Community Engagement**

SHIP's first Client & Family Advisory Committee met in 2007 and continues to come together regularly to provide valuable feedback to SHIP programs and services. Through the Advisory's feedback, SHIP has purchased a portable defibrillator for community events, a van supporting client transportation, and provided input into numerous programs and services within SHIP.

In January 2022, a **Community Advisory Committee** was created in support of the 236 First Street Project with a goal of contributing to the success of the tenant experience. Members consist of neighbours, community partners, individuals with lived experience, Mono and Orangeville town councils, and police.

The **Tenant Steering Committee** at our Hansen building has been meeting since 2019, providing input through tenant representation and input, and developing and maintaining good communication within the building.

Now and moving forward, our goal is to ensure that the client, family, and community voice is heard at all levels of the organization.


## Looking Forward
